



Use of Pupil Premium to support pupils at St Peter's Catholic Primary School 2016-17

What is Pupil Premium and who is it targeted at?

The pupil premium is a Government initiative that targets extra money at pupils:

- in receipt of income based Free School Meals (FSM) or who have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last 6 years;
- children in care (CLA) or recently adopted;
- children whose parents are serving in the armed forces or have done at any point during the last 4 years.

Research shows these children are more at risk of underachievement than their peers. The premium is provided in order to support these pupils in attaining as well as their peers who are not disadvantaged.

How are we at St Peter's spending our share of the funding?

The allocation for Pupil Premium funding at St Peter's 2016-17 is £62,900 Detailed below is the intended spend. The Pupil Premium funding may have a positive secondary impact on all children at the school, or on some other children who are not disadvantaged; as some of the ways money in a school are spent can not be targeted only at Pupil Premium children.

Use of funding	Intended impact	Cost
Pastoral Lead - 21 hours per week.	Improve attendance and punctuality. Tracking of specific needs, progress, attainment and support for PP children to ensure good value for money and removal of barriers to learning. Family support with behaviour or any specific issue in order to support children's learning, including parent workshops. Provide leadership to pastoral team in school so that there is a unified approach to supporting families and children. As a deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead (DDSL), represent the school at child protection conferences and work with other agencies to safeguard and support families and children.	£32,916
Emotional literacy support assistants (ELSA) 36 hours per week	Provide 1:1 support for the most vulnerable children to help them deal with their emotional and social needs, in order for them to be ready to learn. Facilitate nurture groups 5 x week for children who are most in need of the additional support of this programme.	
Behaviour Support Assistant 18 hours per week	Support through nurture and through 1:1 and small group work to enable children to be able to focus on their learning, through support for their behavior and emotional needs.	
1:1 support for Maths Qualified teacher 1 day per	Targeting children who are not on track to narrow the gap in maths attainment between PP and non PP	£6,020

1:1 online maths ThirdSpace tutoring	1:1 weekly online maths tuition for targeted children in year 6 to raise attainment. Up to 4 months improvement is expected – Sutton Trust data.	£3,520
Read, Write Inc Intervention	Targeting children who are not on track to narrow the gap in learning between PP and non PP children for reading. The impact from this intervention allows PP children to access a richer variety of texts which is an identified barrier to learning for some children. In 3 months children make an average of 9 months progress.	£1,100
1 st class at number and Success at Arithmetic Maths Intervention programme. Training of new staff to do these.	Targeting children who are not on track to narrow the gap in learning between PP and non PP children. This intervention helps to improve confidence in maths and aids quicker recall of number facts.	£3,744
Family Forces Club and parent reception. Staff costs and resources including visits, visitors and use of minibus.	To develop support network among services children and families in order for children to feel they can share their experiences and to normalize forces life for these children.	£600
After school library club and librarian tracking and support for children in reading for pleasure	To enable all children to access reading for pleasure, our librarian supports specific identified PP children at risk of falling behind in making book choices, and in using the library regularly.	£2,340
Before school ICT club	To ensure online access for children who don't have it at home. Pupil Premium children are all invited as a priority. Last year this significantly improved learning outside the classroom for these children and improved attendance and punctuality.	£2,925
Breakfast Club	To improve punctuality and ensure children have breakfast before school.	£1,560
Support staff training.	To improve quality and impact of interventions and classroom support.	£500
Maths Resource Packs	Maths resource packs for use at home funded for identified Pupil Premium children to assist parents with maths home learning.	£1,100
Online learning subscription	Whole school Abacus and Bug Club subscription in order to support staff to teach effective maths lessons, set online home learning and give video examples to parents of how to help their children.	£648
Residentials in Year 5 and Year 6	To ensure access to residential cultural and physical experiences for all children there is a small fund	£695

Milk funded for FSM children	To ensure there are not financial barriers to Pupil Premium children accessing milk at school.	£520
